Paul Wertram Kissinger

Paul was born in Staten Island, New York, the only child of Elsie Bertram Kissinger and Paul Townsley Kissinger. He grew up in Reading, Pennsylvania, and attended Albright College just a few blocks from his boyhood home. He then earned his Master of Science degree at Northwestern University and, after a two-year hitch in the U.S. Army, his Ph.D in Physics at Rutgers University.

In 1960, he joined the faculty at DePauw University for what would be a distinguished 40-year career as Professor of Physics and Astronomy. He introduced many innovative techniques to the classroom, including videotape and computer-based study exercises. Students honored him three times as Best Professor, he received the Tucker Award in recognition of his outstanding career at DePauw, and he was named the first Alumni Faculty Fellow. He frequently taught overseas for the Department of Defense and The United Methodist Church. He retired in 2000.

Paul was not only a teacher, however. He was also an accomplished oboist and barbershop quartet singer, a private pilot, an eclipse chaser, a world traveler, and a photographer.

Paul's greatest love was family, and he was a devoted husband, son, father, and grandfather. He is survived by his wife, Joanne (VerBryck); son Scott V. Kissinger and daughter-in-law Kathleen, in Dayton, Ohio; daughter Lisa Kissinger Kaplan and son-in-law David, in Oakland, California; four grandchildren, Eric Paul and Laura Kissinger and Alexander and Matthew Kaplan; and a niece and nephew by marriage.

On the last day of a two-week trip driving through the Dordogne region of France, Paul collapsed and died from a heart attack at Ashford Hospital in Middlesex, England. He will be buried at the Charles Evans Cemetery in Reading, Pennsylvania.
